"Lord, teach us to pray" (Luke 11:1) Daily Prayer

Daily Prayer has many names: Divine Office; Breviary;

Liturgy of the Hours; Morning and Evening Prayer; Matins and Evensong; Lauds, Vespers, and Compline; and so on. The discipline of praying psalms, reading from the scriptures, and interceding and giving thanks is followed many times a day, around the globe, day in, day out, week in, week out, season upon season, year after year, back millennia, with and through the synagogue into the mists of time.

Do you want to join in? One of the cool things about it is that if you miss one of your prayer times, you know others are still carrying on this earth-circling wave of prayer. And whenever you do join in, that's exactly what we are doing: joining the endless round of prayer and praise, in fact being inserted into Christ's prayer, into God's inner life.

How might you start? You can ask someone who is already following this discipline. I have prayed like this for decades. Clergy, Religious, and many others do this daily. Anglicans, Roman Catholics, Orthodox, and other denominations also have this discipline. You can follow the instructions in a book with Daily Prayer, and a bit of trial and error. It's great if you can pray this way with someone else.

There's lots of different websites and apps that can help – you can find Daily Prayer online or on a (free) app. Search online for one of the names given at the start of this reflection.

One of the issues with starting to pray Daily Prayer is that it can appear very complex. Don't let that daunt you. Pray as you can – not as you can't.

His delight shall be in the fear of the Lord. In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judæa, proclaiming, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said, "The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.'"

Now John wore clothing of camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then the people of Jerusalem and all Judæa were going out to him, and all the region along the Jordan, and they were baptised by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

But when he saw many Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruit worthy of repentance. Do not presume to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the axe is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire. I baptise you with water for repentance, but one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing-floor and will gather his wheat into the granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

Sermon: Fr Bosco Peters

Affirmation of Faith:

Today's "Stir up..." collect goes back over thirteen centuries to at least the Gelasian Sacramentary. It is a prayer shared by Anglicans, Roman Catholics, and others. In the Sarum missal, collects for four of the five Sundays before Christmas all began "Excita" (Stir up...). The exception was the Third Sunday, associated with an Ember Week and Gaudete ("Rejoice").

The Great Thanksgiving prayer used today is sourced from the Apostolic Tradition, attributed to Hippolytus of Rome, 18 centuries ago. It is one of the most popular Eucharistic Prayers, used by Roman Catholics, Anglicans, and others. It is an agreement (formulary) of our Anglican Church that allows its use at our Mass.
