

From the Vicar...

Dear friends,

Last Sunday we had a series of wonderful celebrations in the church. It was good to have the school with us for our Mothering Sunday service. And then in the evening we had the Festive Evensong for Mountfort's bicentenary. With over 300 people in the church, it was an uplifting service of praise and thanksgiving in the rich Anglican Evensong tradition. Thank you to those who helped with the service and the supper afterwards. This Friday (4th) is our last school service as we farewell Penny from her time as principal, followed by an afternoon tea. We are once again grateful for Penny's time with the school and all that she has achieved. On Sunday 13 April following morning tea we will be having a Special General Meeting to look at the next steps around the Parish Office Renovations. Please do join us.

This Sunday is the Fifth Sunday in Lent. Until 1959, the fifth Sunday in Lent was officially known in the Roman Catholic Church as "Passion Sunday". It marked the beginning of a two-week-long period known as Passiontide, which is still observed by Catholics, who attend the Extraordinary Form or, of Anglican Ordinariates, as well as Western Rite Orthodox Christians, and some Anglicans.

In 1960, Pope John XXIII's Code of Rubrics changed the name of that Sunday to "First Sunday of the Passion", bringing the name into harmony with the name that Pope Pius XII gave five years earlier to the sixth Sunday in Lent, "Second Sunday of the Passion or Palm Sunday".

Pope Paul VI in 1969 removed a distinction that existed (although with overlap) between Lent and Passiontide, which began with the fifth Sunday in Lent. The Passion was moved to Palm Sunday in order to bring deeper meaning into the Holy Week commemorations. We now have two interlinked liturgies on Palm Sunday and so since 1970, it has been "Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord."

This Sunday's Gospel story of the women anointing Jesus' feet begins to shift our focus towards the events of Palm Sunday and Holy week. Do join us we journey with Jesus towards Jerusalem, and his Passion.

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith.

I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal, but I press on to lay hold of that for which Christ has laid hold of me. Brothers and sisters, I do not consider that I have laid hold of it, but one thing I have laid hold of: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal, toward the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

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Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those reclining with him. Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus's feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, "Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?" (He said this not because he cared about the poor but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) Jesus said, "Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me."
