Letter from Fr Peter Williams

Dear friends,

Lent began on Wednesday, and we marked that in the Liturgies in the Church. During the 40 days of Lent we are invited to return to a simple and total trust in God who is the source and end of all life. We are called to reject all the temptations that would persuade us to put our trust elsewhere, in less worthy things.

In the Gospels we see Jesus facing this 'time of trial' and choosing between two worldviews, both apparently justified by the words of the Bible. He rejects the devil's worldview that is based on the magical, the powerful, the spectacular, and the immense popular appeal that might be associated with such things. He proclaims and chooses a worldview that is rooted in humble, non-coercive, sacrificial love, and in his short ministry he demonstrates this in faithfulness to God, and in costly service.

We are called to see our own choices, our own way of life, alongside this way of Jesus, and to allow his way to influence ours. I hope that we can all make some effort to do so during this season of Lent, and that we may encounter the Easter celebration with mind and heart renewed.

This evening, the prayer at 7pm will be in the style of the Community of Taizé in France. It is characterised by prayerful chants, communal silence, and prayer for reconciliation.

The presider at the Sung Mass today is Bishop Tom Brown who has joined this parish in retirement. The Gospel is read by the Revd Kate Churchill, his wife, who was curate at St Michael's two decades ago.

On Tuesday evening at 7pm, the Induction of our new vicar, Fr Jordon Greatbatch will take place here. Bishop Peter will preside and there are likely to be a number of visitors from the Diocese and the community. This will be followed by a special supper in the Hall.

I hope that through Lent our Church community will be strengthened to face 'the time of trial', to be delivered from evil, and to give itself to God's way wholly and joyfully.

First Reading: (sit) Genesis 2: 15–17, 3: 1–7 Fr Ron Smith The Lord God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it. And the Lord God commanded the man, "You may freely eat of every tree of the garden; but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall die."

Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the Lord God had made. He said to the woman, "Did God say, You shall not eat from any tree in the garden?" The woman said to the serpent, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; but God said, You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die."

But the serpent said to the woman, "You will not die; for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." Second Reading: Romans 5: 12–19

Margaret Maclagan Just as sin came into the world through one man, and death came through sin, and so death spread to all because all have sinned—sin was indeed in the world before the law, but sin is not reckoned when there is no law. Yet death exercised dominion from Adam to Moses, even over those whose sins were not like the transgression of Adam, who is a type of the one who was to come.

But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if the many died through the one man's trespass, much more surely have the grace of God and the free gift in the grace of the one man, Jesus Christ, abounded for the many. And the free gift is not like the effect of the one man's sin. For the judgement following one trespass brought condemnation, but the free gift following many trespasses brings justification.

If, because of the one man's trespass, death exercised dominion through that one, much more surely will those who receive the abundance of grace and the free gift of righteousness exercise dominion in life through the one man, Jesus Christ. Therefore just as one man's trespass led to condemnation for all, so the act of righteousness of one leads to justification and life for all. For just as by the one person's disobedience the many were made sinners, so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous.

Then the devil left him, and suddenly angels came and waited on him.

Sermon: **Bishop Tom Brown**

Affirmation of Faith:

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection ♥ of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.
