From the Vicar...

Dear friends,

Last weekend was a joyous occasion as some of us attended Deacon Robert's ordination and then welcomed him to the parish at the 10am service. Robert will be with us as curate for 2 years, typically one year as a Deacon and then one as Priest. It is good to have him with us. As we enter into December we of course start to prepare for the important Feast of Christmas. It is usually a time when we have visitors or newcomers and it is a good opportunity to welcome them in our midst. Connected with this is the issue surrounding length of the service, particularly notices. We love to hear what is going on in the parish and all the variety of ministry that people offer. However, we do need to be mindful of the length. If you do have a notice for the parish, please get it in writing to Taunya by at least Wednesday so that she can include it in the service sheet. If you have a notice in writing and you would like it highlighted, please let me know and I can do this. Of course, it is good to hear from people time to time but we just need to be mindful of length. Thank you.

This Sunday we enter into the Season of Advent. There is evidence from the mid-4th century on concerning some period of preparation for the Christmas-Epiphany celebration. Length and emphasis varied from place to place. Some regions kept a relatively long Advent (from November 11); others, a rather brief one. In Rome the season evolved to a 4-week preparation focusing on the joyful celebration of the Lord's Incarnation. In Gaul there was a longer, heavily penitential season emphasising the Lord's glorious advent at the end of time as Lord of history and judge of the universe. Roman practice from the 12th century, codified by the Council of Trent and enhanced by the greatly enriched lectionary of Vatican Council II, combines these different emphases. Which Anglicans also adopted.

The violet vestments (with rose as an option on the 3rd Sunday) and the preaching of John the Baptist bespeak the penitential aspect which invites the people to reform. The Gloria is omitted, as during Lent, but for a somewhat different reason, as the official commentary on the revised Calendar notes: "So that on Christmas night the song of the angels may ring out anew in all its freshness." On the other hand, there is a clear note of joyful expectation: The Alleluia is retained before the Gospel.

Advent is a time for looking both backward and forward. We look backward as we prepare to celebrate the historical birth of Jesus of Nazareth at Christmas. Before that birth people longed for the Messiah who would restore Israel to her former power. We identify with that ancient longing for restoration as we await Christ's coming more fully into our lives and also as we await His coming again.

People will faint from fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world, for the powers of the heavens will be shaken. Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in a cloud' with power and great glory. Now when these things begin to take place, stand up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near."

Then he told them a parable: "Look at the fig tree and all the trees; as soon as they sprout leaves you can see for yourselves and know that summer is already near.
