

The First Sunday of Lent 9 March 2025

From the Vicar...

Dear friends,

It was good to gather last night for our Ash Wednesday service as we began the Lenten Season. The name *dies cinerum* (day of ashes) which it bears in the Roman Missal is found in the earliest existing copies of the Gregorian Sacramentary and probably dates from at least the eighth century. In earlier ages a penitential procession often followed the rite of the distribution of the ashes, but this is not now prescribed. There can be no doubt that the custom of distributing the ashes to all the faithful arose from a devotional imitation of the practice observed in the case of public penitents. In the Old Testament those who repented of their sins often sprinkled themselves with ashes and clothed their bodies with sackcloth.

And what of Lent itself? The Teutonic word *Lent*, which we employ to denote the forty days' fast preceding Easter, originally meant no more than the spring season. Still, it has been used from the Anglo-Saxon period to translate the more significant Latin term *quadragesima* meaning the "forty days", or more literally the "fortieth day".

In the existing remains of the first three centuries of Christianity we find both considerable diversity of practice regarding the fast before Easter and also a gradual process of development in the matter of its duration. The church father Irenaeus discusses some sort of fast before Easter but he is not definitive about how long the fast should be. We may then fairly conclude that Irenaeus about the year 190 knew nothing of any Easter fast of forty days. This of course took many centuries to develop into what we now call Lent and the fast associated with it.

Most importantly for us, Lent is not so much about what we give up or take on but about how we approach it. At the Ash Wednesday service, I shared some thoughts from the great father of monks Benedict. One of the things that he recommends other than fasting and prayer is some form of spiritual reading. I encourage you to find a good book to accompany you through this period. We will also be taking up this opportunity of study with our Lent Study which is taking place on Thursdays at 11am and 6pm. As we now enter into this time of reflection may you know more deeply Jesus' love but also his passion so that we may approach the great Feast of Easter with open and sincere hearts.

Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread." Jesus answered him, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone'."

Then the devil led him up and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And the devil said to him, "To you I will give their glory and all this authority; for it has been given over to me, and I give it to anyone I please. If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours." Jesus answered him, "It is written, 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him'."
