

The Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time 6 July 2025 Dear friends,

This Sunday we move back into Ordinary Time. Which is the time in the liturgical year between Christmastide and Eastertide, or their respective preparatory seasons of Advent and Lent. The liturgical color assigned to Ordinary Time is green. The last Sunday of Ordinary Time is the Solemnity of Christ the King.

The word "ordinary" as used here comes from the ordinal numerals by which the weeks are identified or counted, from the 1st week of Ordinary Time in January to the 34th week that begins toward the end of November. It replaced the older method of counting whereby the Sundays of the first period were called Sundays after Epiphany and those of the second period Sundays after Pentecost. In the Anglican Church the counting started from Trinity Sunday, with this Sunday being the 4th Sunday after Trinity. The Church of England still retains this way of counting the Sundays. Of course there is nothing ordinary about it, and the church continues to celebrate Christ' resurrection every Sunday when we gather for Holy Eucharist.

This week we welcome our new school principal Liz Coster. The school welcomes Liz on Thursday 3rd July with a mihi whakatau (welcome) in the hall followed by a service in the church. We will then get an opportunity to meet Liz this Sunday when she will be joining us for Mass. We look forward to Liz becoming part of our school and church communities.

Last Sunday we had a notice about a survey for our upcoming Mission Impact Review. Thank you once again for taking the time to fill in that survey which will help with that review. In some sense our Gospel reading this Sunday fits the theme of mission. For it has Jesus sending out his seventy-two disciples: ...to every town and place he intended to visit.

That is an interesting remark. Who comes first to any place? Is it Jesus or me? As a person baptised in Jesus' name, I am a part of his Body. Where the body is, there, too, is the person. Where I go then, Jesus also comes to visit. Jesus does not go before us. Nor does he come after us. We come together!

But if I do not go or if I do not reach out, then to some extent Jesus does not go and Jesus does not reach out. I am part of his Body; I am the visible indication of his presence. My voice is his voice. As He told his disciples: Whoever listens to you listens to me...

If I do not speak his message, who will be able to listen to it?

The disciples came back from their mission rejoicing and excited. They discovered they could do the same things that Jesus was doing—and so can we. As we gather this Sunday for Eucharist let us remember that as we receive the Body of Christ, we too are called to be that body in the world.

If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption from the flesh, but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal life from the Spirit. So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all and especially for those of the family of faith. See what large letters I make when I am writing in my own hand! It is those who want to make a good showing in the flesh who try to compel you to be circumcised—only that they may not be persecuted for the cross of Christ. Even the circumcised do not themselves obey the law, but they want you to be circumcised so that they may boast about your flesh. May I never boast of anything except the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me and I to the world. For neither circumcision nor uncircumcision is anything, but a new creation is everything! As for those who will follow this rule—peace be upon them, and mercy, and upon the Israel of God.

Gospel: Luke 10:1-11, 16-20 Deacon Robert Jamieson After this the Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. He said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest. Go on your way; I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals, and greet no one on the road. Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this house!' And if a person of peace is there, your peace will rest on that person, but if not, it will return to you. Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the labourer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; cure the sick who are there, and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.'
